The new management Plan for the 163 mile Tarka Trail has been developed and agreed jointly by those directly involved with maintaining and improving it. Full list at www.northdevonbiosphere.org.uk/tarkatrail

It sets out significant management issues and policies to address them together with actions needed to deliver improvement. It provides a firm basis for partnership building, consultation and openness, and for bringing in additional funds.

The Trail

163 miles (262.2km) of walking through some of the best landscapes in Devon.

18 miles rail service between Barnstaple and Eggesford Station on the Tarka Line.

31 miles promoted for cycling on an old railway route between Braunton and Meeth, with the 10.4 mile section leading north from open to and promoted for horse riding.

Over 1 million people used the Trail in 2011 it and is a key contributor to the tourism economy of northern Devon.

Throughout its length provides valuable habitat for wildlife and a space for recreation and community involvement



The Tarka Trail is one of the County's network of 12 Strategic Regional Routes. These routes are second only to National Trails in terms of their importance for the County and are deemed worthy of additional management coordination.
